You probably remember when you had to study William Shakespeare and his works. The confusion because of the "old" language, the wordiness of the speeches, and the length of some plays confuse even the best of students. Let's take a look at how one of our High School teachers brought *The Bard* to technology.

Bringing the 16th Century to the 21st

Today's answer to Juliet's famous question of, "O Romeo, Romeo, wherefore art thou, Romeo?" might just be "Facebook message me and we'll talk about it". Ok, so maybe not but you get the idea. Shakespeare has gone social in Coach Kevin Clark's class this year with the help of Facebook and texting. The final project for Romeo and Juliet is a dual project Coach Clark "stole" (or Tech Lifted) from another teacher online. It includes a writing assignment and alternative assignment with technology options on both sides. Students use technology every day and by giving them the option of incorporating it into a project allows them to "delve into a portion and make it their own" says

Coach. It's more than an essay, although that is a choice; it's Romeo and Juliet come to life through the computer or phones.

R, meet me @ my balcony. <3 J

The first part of the assignment is writing. One of the options is to rewrite the balcony scene as if you were there and would relay it to a friend via text. This "requires a bit more depth than just reading and or watching the play" explains Coach Clark. Because a student is re-wording this famous scene, they have to understand what is actually being said,

which is sometimes difficult with Shakespeare. They also need to grasp the feelings of both Juliet and Romeo; desperation at the situation and love for each other.

On the alternative side of the assignment, students could choose numerous ways to show their creativity and understanding of Romeo and Juliet's story. One way this could be done was to make a Facebook page for one major character and one minor character. They must include pictures, status updates and friends. Facebook is a wonderful tool to see these characters as people, have them interact with their classmates and put themselves into their chosen characters's shoes. According to Coach Clark, most students did well with using Facebook, although, "it did require close monitoring and a bit of leniency". Having your students make a Facebook page in class requires classroom management skills and diligence by the teacher. However, allowing them to integrate this type of social media and technology into their classwork, opens up a student's mind that there are many ways to complete an assignment, Shakespeare can be cool and that homework isn't always "work". All in all, Coach saw an increase in motivation with his students, and they seemed to enjoy the project overall. I think it was a win-win for all involved.

End-Of-Year Tech Tips

Before you head to the beach this summer, we have a list of things to do with your technology items so they stay in working order ready for next school year. Following these simple things will save you some headaches in late August.

1. If you are going somewhere and leaving your laptop behind, be sure to charge it to 50% then shut down. By doing so, you can help save the battery life.
